DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

Hello everyone

I have been enjoying discovering the latest research about dyscalculia in preparation for our workshop on April 5th, "Dyscalculia from the Inside Out". We are offering it to any teacher who is interested: not just teacher-tutors who are registered with SMC. Already 15 teachers have signed up from primary and secondary schools in Christchurch: so there is certainly a thirst for knowledge in that field – even on a Saturday! Our guest presenter is Barbara Adcock who is a practising Educational Psychologist in Christchurch and was a teacher at both primary and secondary levels for over 30 years. Barbara will talk about her experience of dyscalculia and how children with this might appear to teachers in their classes. Barbara will make the link between formal assessments, such as the WJ and the WISC/WIAT and how these could inform interventions with children with dyscalculia. We will also spend part of the session developing and trialling teacher tools for assessment. A very practical workshop! (News flash: we have had to postpone the workshop due to a bereavement in Barbara's family.)

We are delighted to be able to support three registered teachers to work on the 2025 SPELD course. The cost is a considerable outlay for the trainees so our financial support (made possible through your generous grants) has enabled them to sign up. As you can imagine, there are conditions attached, and they are bonded to us for three years. This will help us grow our pool of specialist teachers which has been declining largely due to retirement, and for which there is always a strong demand. We have not had the expertise to offer specialist training for a number of years so we are very pleased to be able to tap into SPELD's considerable expertise. It was great to be able to visit their national office in Royal Oak when I was on leave in Auckland recently.

We thank all funders who make our work possible. It is always such a thrill when we receive financial support from trusts, service groups, individuals, businesses and random benefactors! It is so wonderful to be able pass on this support to incredibly grateful clients.

Staff changes at the Centre



Could you help another student access the benefits of an assessment?

It costs the Centre at least \$800 to provide a professional assessment of Specific Learning Disability, but to keep our services as accessible as possible, we charge on a sliding scale:

\$795 Standard fee

\$685 Subsidised family fee (for all clients without outside funding support)

\$560 Community Services Card holders

\$440 Beneficiaries

Currently through the generosity of various supporters we also have funding to offer additional financial assistance to qualifying families in need.

Specific grants and donations cover about 40% of subsidies, and the other 60% currently comes from the Centre's general bank account. We are so grateful to everyone who already gives towards this purpose, as well as for general grants and donations that can also be put towards subsidies.
